March Birthstone Aquamarine

Aquamarine (from Lat. aqua marina, "water of the sea") is a blue or turquoise variety of beryl. It occurs at most localities which yield ordinary beryl, some of the finest coming from Russia. The gemgravel placer deposits of Sri Lanka contain aquamarine. Clear yellow beryl, such as occurs in Brazil, is sometimes called aquamarine chrysolite. When corundum presents the bluish tint of typical aquamarine, it is often termed Oriental aquamarine. The deep blue version of aquamarine is called maxixe. Its color fades to white when exposed to sunlight or is subjected to heat treatment, though the color returns with irradiation.

The pale blue color of aquamarine is attributed to Fe²⁺. The Fe³⁺ ions produce golden-yellow color, and when both Fe²⁺ and Fe³⁺ are present, the color is a darker blue as in maxixe. Decoloration of maxixe by light or heat thus may be due to the charge transfer Fe³⁺ and Fe²⁺. [5][6][7][8] Dark-blue maxixe color can be produced in green, pink or yellow beryl by irradiating it with high-energy particles (gamma rays, neutrons or even X-rays). [9]

In the <u>United States</u>, aquamarines can be found at the summit of <u>Mt. Antero</u> in the <u>Sawatch Range</u> in central <u>Colorado</u>. In Wyoming, aquamarine has

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been discovered in the Big Horn mountains, near Powder River Pass. In <u>Brazil</u>, there are mines in the states of <u>Minas Gerais</u>, <u>Espírito Santo</u> and <u>Bahia</u>. The Mines of <u>Colombia</u>, <u>Zambia</u>, <u>Madagascar</u>, <u>Malawi</u>, <u>Tanzania</u> and <u>Kenya</u> also produce aquamarine.

The biggest aquamarine ever mined was found at the city of Marambaia, Minas Gerais, Brazil, in 1910. It weighed over 110 kg, and its dimensions were 48.5 cm long and 42 cm in diameter.

Rock Hunting in Oklahoma by Phillip Nierstheimer

Carl, Barbara and I joined the Tulsa rock club for a field trip to collect claystone geodes in the Permian redbeds near Tecumseh. Mudballs formed in shallow Permian seas. When the seas receded, the mudballs slowly dried out, causing their interiors to shrink and crack. Over time, the remaining minerals precipitated out, forming crystal linings in their hollow interiors, composed primarily of barite and calcite in various forms, some included with oxidized iron molecules giving them a deep, brick red coloration.

The weather was great, the folks interesting and buckets full of geodes are very heavy. More to come after we get a chance to crack open the rocks.
